CLASSICS - DEPARTMENTAL INFORMATION

We are proud to be one of the few state schools in the country to offer Classics.

Every student studies Latin and Classical Civilisation in Year 7, with an option to continue studying Latin as their second language in Years 8 and 9, with two classes in each Year group. Latin and Classical Civilisation are both offered at GCSE using the OCR syllabus, and both continue to be popular options. Pupils can also study Latin and Classical Civilisation at A Level, using the OCR syllabus. Both continue to be popular in the sixth form, with Latin taught in collaboration with Watford Grammar School for Boys. A vibrant and rich enrichment programme is offered, including trips abroad, theatre and museum visits, and clubs for all key stages. A highlight of the extra-curricular calendar was last year's senior production of Euripides' Trojan Women.

The department is staffed by two full time teachers, teaching both Latin and Classical Civilisation. We have two dedicated Classics classrooms, which are well resourced with textbooks and display materials. The department works collaboratively in creating resources, developing the curriculum, and providing a full enrichment curriculum.

Classics is part of the ethos of our school and a key element of the curriculum. We believe that Classics has an important pedagogical function to play in the modern world and we give all pupils the opportunity to study this rich and rewarding subject. We are a forward-thinking department, and believe in Classics as a useful tool through which to examine the modern world. We are committed to a diverse and inclusive approach to teaching Classics, and are constantly seeking to develop and improve our curriculum. We aim to foster in pupils an interest in the ancient world and its culture, and to encourage pupils to become both critical thinkers and empathetic citizens of the world.

Curriculum:

Key Stage 3 (Years 7-9)

<u>Year 7:</u> All pupils are introduced to the Greco –Roman world during fortnightly lessons. The course focuses on the Latin language using the Cambridge Latin Course, and the civilisation of ancient Greece and Rome, with a particular focus on Greek mythology.

<u>Years 8 and 9</u>: During Years 8 and 9, pupils have the option to study Latin as their second language. We follow the Cambridge Latin Course, and aim to develop a firm understanding of Latin syntax and grammar, alongside an appreciation for the culture and society that underpins the language.

Key Stage 4 (Years 10-11)

Latin (OCR): Pupils have the option to continue their study of Latin as their language GCSE. Pupils continue to learn the grammar and syntax of the language, developing their understanding and meeting more complex syntactical structures. We follow John Taylor's Latin to GCSE textbooks, preparing pupils with GCSE level translation and language exercises. Pupils also study one prose text and one verse text, translating the works together in class and analysing stylistic features used by the author. Pupils learn to

develop a personal response to the literature, and often find this a hugely enjoyable aspect of the GCSE course.

<u>Classical Civilisation (OCR)</u>: Pupils also have the option to study Classical Civilisation at GCSE, which offers a broad study of the ancient world, covering a wide range of disciplines from art and archaeology to ancient literature. The Myth and Religion unit investigates Greek and Roman mythology and religious beliefs, including the study of religious buildings and rituals. In the Homeric World unit, pupils read sections of Homer's Odyssey and study Bronze-Age Mycenaean life and culture.

Key Stage 5 (Years 12-13)

Latin (OCR): Pupils have the option to continue their study of Latin to A Level, offered in conjunction with Watford Grammar School for Boys. Pupils continue to learn more complex grammatical structures, and practice A Level standard unseen works of translation using John Taylor's Latin Beyond GCSE. They study one prose set text and one verse set text, analysing the stylistic features of the literature and developing a secure knowledge of the cultural and social context underpinning it.

<u>Classical Civilisation (OCR)</u>: Pupils have the option to study Classical Civilisation at A Level, with no prior study of the subject necessary. In the World of Hero unit, pupils study Homer's Iliad and Virgil's Aeneid, alongside the cultural and social context of both epics. In the Greek Drama unit, pupils study the tragedies Oedipus the King and the Bacchae, alongside Aristophanes' comedy the Frogs. Pupils also study a range of material sources, examining archaeological sites and vase paintings to gain a deeper understanding of the role of theatre in ancient Greece. The final unit studied is Love and Relationships, offering pupils a unique opportunity to study the history of human relationships in the ancient world. Pupils study the love poetry of Sappho and Ovid, and the philosophy of Plato and Seneca. Alongside this, pupils study the societal conventions of Greece and Rome and attitudes towards gender, homosexuality, marriage and divorce, allowing pupils to look at some highly contemporary issues through an ancient perspective.

Enrichment: Annual Trips, Events and the Extended Curriculum

- Trips abroad: trips to Italy or Greece
- Iris Magazine: termly magazine with contributions from students on the ancient world
- KS4 and KS5: academic conferences; guest speakers; theatre trips; trips to the British Museum; Senior Classics Society a student led group hosting a different debate each week
- KS3: Year 7 trip to Verulamium; Junior Classics Club a weekly club looking in more depth at Greek mythology
